



From the Executive Director, Abide Collective

The Abide Collective's "year" runs from the first of April to the end of March. We do this for a number of reasons, primarily so we're not having to rush through the typical year end things in December, a time that's demanding enough as it is. Little did we know when setting this schedule we would also be "framing" twelve of the most difficult months many people and countries have ever experienced, April of 2020 - March of 2021. I admit things suddenly didn't get better April 1st of this year. But I think about all that changed in those twelve months, all the ways our lives were suddenly and lastingly altered. By God's grace and the sacrificial generosity of so many of you, the Abide Collective was able to adjust, continue to serve in significant ways, and I really believe, come out stronger.

Some highlights:

•We were able to fund a house build with our partners, Homes of Hope in Mexico, helping them keep building when foreign teams couldn't enter the country.

▶We helped with the settlement of a refugee family from The Congo who arrived at the height of the shutdown.

•We pulled off a small and careful Colorado outdoor retreat.

•We safely hosted a number of people in our home for rest and spiritual direction.

• We were able to scout new locations for future outdoor retreats.

•We led a number of events and studies via Zoom that connected people from all over the US and other countries.

Even in the midst of this time of significant grief and adjustment, these good things happened. We wouldn't be here without each of you and we are sobered, but more hopeful than ever for what comes next.
